

- + **Cindy Peterson**—Cindy was a former member of Apostles—she died on August 8th.
- + Patricia Truchlinski-Pat was Chris Avery's aunt—she was the youngest of three sisters with Chris's mother, Anne, being the oldest. Carol was the middle sister. Pat went to secretarial school eventually working in the Board of Elections of Erie County, Buffalo NY. She was married to Ed for 45 years—he was a lieutenant in the Buffalo Police Department. After retirement, they moved to Sarasota Florida and settled there. After Ed passed about 12 years ago she lived in their condo and stayed active in the local garden club until she entered assisted living. News From Your World Hunger Team

The Virginia ELCA Hunger Committee is resuming its *Food and Faith* series. Our Fall sessions will emphasize how to be an effective advocate for the hungry. We have three exciting programs to share with you.

Thursday, September 9th, 12:00 pm – 1:00 pm Virginia Interfaith Power & Light Co-Directors, Faith Harris and Kendyl Crawford will discuss food injustices, the intersection of water, transportation, and food deserts. They will illustrate ways individuals can advocate in their local communities. The mission of Virginia Interfaith Power & Light is to collaborate among people of faith and conscience to grow healthy communities by advancing climate and environmental justice.

Thursday, October 14th, 12:00 pm — 1:00 pm Virginia State Senator John Edwards will talk about how to advocate with your government officials. Senator Edwards represents the 21st District and serves on the Courts of Justice, Privileges and Elections, and Transportation committees.

Thursday, November 11th, 12:00 pm – 1:00 pm A representative of Bread for the World will speak on advocating for hunger issues both nationally and internationally. Bread for the World is a non-partisan, Christian advocacy organization based in the United States that advocates for policy changes to end hunger. January 2022

New Bible Study Begins

Pastor Jeniffer will begin a new Bible study in September on Wednesdays at 11:00 AM via Zoom. We will be studying our Sunday morning Lectionary readings using the four steps of Lectio Divina-read, meditate, pray, and contemplate. The Lectionary provides a threeyear (Year A, B and C) series of readings for Sunday starting with the season of Advent, four weeks before Christmas Day. For each Sunday and festival, three readings and a psalm are suggested and include: a Gospel reading, an Old Testament reading, and a New Testament reading. Each year of the Revised Common Lectionary centers on one of the synoptic Gospels – Matthew, Mark and Luke. The Gospel of John is read periodically in all three years and is especially frequent in Year B.

News from Our Synod and Churchwide

+ From the Office of the Bishop of the Virginia Synod-As the Delta variant of COVID-19 continues to spread quickly around the country, the CDC released new guidance for vaccinated individuals which notes that "to maximize protection from the Delta variant and prevent possibly spreading it to others, wear a mask indoors in public if you are in an area of substantial or high transmission" (https:// www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/vaccines/ fully-vaccinated.html). The CDC provides a map which identifies areas of substantial or high transmission. You can see the map at: https:// covid.cdc.gov/covid-data-tracker/#county-view. While the risk of serious illness is reduced by the vaccine, the Delta variant appears to be as contagious as the chicken pox, so additional precautions are warranted even for those who are fully vaccinated. As you think about next steps for the health and well-being of those connected to your ministry, the Virginia Synod

Office of the Bishop encourages everyone to:

1. Get Vaccinated! The vaccines are highly effective, extremely safe and free to everyone. Getting vaccinated will help protect you against the most serious effects of COVID-19. Getting vaccinated will help protect your neighbors including children and those unable to be vaccinated. Getting vaccinated is the best way to safely return to worship and other activities.

2. Follow CDC Guidance! The CDC is monitoring the transmission of COVID-19 and adapting guidance in response to what is happening in each community. You can learn more about current CDC guidance at: https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/index.html.

Remember we are the body of Christ and individually members of the body. As you make decisions, consider the impact of those decisions on the wider community. While it may feel safe to sing unmasked in worship, for example, that decision could negatively impact another member of the community by putting them at risk or by making them feel uncomfortable or even unwelcome at worship. Each community is different, so unlike at the beginning of the pandemic it is impossible to present a single response that is appropriate in each community, but by getting vaccinated and encouraging others to get vaccinated, by following CDC guidance, and by caring for your neighbor, we can make strides toward returning safely to the activities we all love. The Worship Ministry Team held a special meeting after receiving this guidance and a decision was made to not sing during worship for the time being.
