A Word from Pastor Jay Christmas in July

In so many ways, I am drawn to the beginning of the Gospel of Luke, and the story of the birth of

Messiah. The story portrayed there in the words written by the Evangelist so many years ago still captures our hearts and minds as it vividly tells the story of Emmanuel, of a God who loves us so much that this God will do anything, including taking on human flesh and entering into the limits of time and space to be with us in direct relationship. Much of my pondering about this incredible story, however, is centered around the figure of Mary. I hardly can begin to understand, let alone describe, the emotions, the thoughts, the uncertainty, the unparalleled realization Mary must have encountered as the words of the angel began to seep into her consciousness and the plan of God began to unfold through her. This unfolding would turn her life upside down, bringing her scorn and, to some degree, danger as the situation evolved. She has been told that she has been chosen by God to help bring about the fulfillment of God's plan of salvation for all people. Mary. A smalltown girl without fame or notoriety or power or high education or prestige would be, of all people, singled out to carry God's Word to the world, to birth incarnation. What does one do when confronted with this realization?

Mary's response, which is one of my favorite pieces of Scripture, stands out as a defiant assertion. "Here am I, the servant of the Lord; let it be with me according to your word." While she didn't know the path ahead, she must have sensed this new reality would change her life in many ways, and that the future would not be easy.

Uncertainty is a part of human life. I don't need to tell you this. Each of us faces uncertainty often on our journey. Unfortunately, uncertainty often can provoke anxiety, and anxiety can be paralyzing for us as we face a future we cannot fully predict. While God indeed speaks promises over our lives, God does not promise to reveal to us ahead of time what course our lives will take. Much about the future remains unknown until we encounter it. That is why Mary stands out for me as a wonderful example of strength in the midst of uncertainty. She could have balked at the announcement and proclaimed her inability, her youth, her lack of credentials or understanding or life-experience. Instead, when faced with a possibility of God's working through her for the sake of the world, Mary says, "Ok, I accept. Lord, I am your servant and will do my best to walk with you in this uncertain journey."

In today's world, where everything seems to have changed so much, so quickly, and we do not know where the future will take us, perhaps Mary can shine forth as an example. Luke doesn't say she was without anxiety or doubt or fear. Luke simply tells us that Mary accepted

the mission God placed before her, and Christmas- incarnation happened. Moving forward as a congregation, we are heirs of this missional resolve shown by Mary. We don't know what the future holds for us, but we do know that we have been called, we have been chosen to do mission, we have been touched by God's grace and love and promise, so that, like Mary, we can open ourselves to the possibilities which the future might present. Perhaps the most faithful thing we can say in the midst of our uncertainty, our anxiety, our doubt, is "Here am I, the servant of the Lord; let it be with me according to your word." Opening ourselves to God's possibilities in this way may allow the incarnate word to be revealed through us.

Pastor Jay Serafin Called To Be Apostles' Pastor

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

Report from the Virginia Synod Assembly

Lutherans from all around the Virginia Synod gathered at Roanoke College on June 9–11 for the 2023 Virginia Synod Assembly. The Synod welcomed **Deacon Sue Rothmeyer**, Secretary of the ELCA as our Churchwide Representative. The Assembly theme was The Way in the Wilderness. Hear the voice of the prophet Isaiah call out: "In the wilderness prepare the way of the Lord" (Isaiah 40:3a).

Elections

With the pending retirement of Bishop Bob Humphrey, the Assembly undertook the process of electing the next Bishop of the Virginia Synod. On the sixth ballot, the Rev. Dr. Phyllis Blair Milton, Pastor at Holy Communion, Portsmouth, was elected with 175 votes to 172 votes for the Rev. Kelly Bayer Derrick, Assistant to the Bishop of the Virginia Synod. Bishop-elect Milton will take office September 1. She will be installed as Bishop on Saturday, October 21 at First Presbyterian Church in Waynesboro. The Assembly elected **Blythe Scott** (First, Norfolk) to serve as the new Vice-President of the Virginia Synod and elected Judy Casteele (Good Shepherd, Lexington) to serve as the Secretary of the Virginia Synod. In addition to the election of the Bishop, Vice-President, and Secretary of the Synod, the Assembly elected lay leaders to serve on the Synod Council, the Consultation Committee, and the Committee on Discipline. Worship

The Assembly opened with a service of Holy Communion. Pastor Liz Radtke, Virginia Synod Truth and Love Coordinator, served as the preacher for worship and focused on the Assembly theme, 'The Way in the Wilderness.' On Saturday morning, Bishop Humphrey former Synod leaders who had presided at a service of remembrance for rostered ministers and former Synod leaders who had died in the last two years and also remembered congregations that had

closed. Saturday's Assembly concluded with a Festival Service of Holy Communion that included commissioning eleven lay preachers George Donovan, Laura Doughty, Janet Gomez, James Ingraham, Erich Lantz, David Mayersky, Sylvia Miles, Ray Riggin, Kristee Trumbo, Judith Wilfong, Leon Zimmermann. The final day of the Assembly began with morning prayer and ended with a closing worship service featuring a sermon by Deacon Emily Edmunds (Chaplain, Virginia Baptist Hospital, Lynchburg) and the installation of those serving in leadership roles within the life of the Virginia Synod. This year the offering was designated to support the Lutheran Disaster Response and Virginia Synod Disaster Response.

Celebrations

We celebrated rostered minister ordination anniversaries, congregation anniversaries, lay leadership and five volunteers were recognized for the 2023 Serving Boldly Awards. The award recipients were Kisha Johnson (Good Shepherd, Galax), Carol Jones (Christ, Richmond), Robert Perry (Zion, Edinburg Parish), Diana Tiller-Dichtel (St. Stephen, Williamsburg), and Connie Watkins (St. Mark's, Roanoke). We will celebrate and honor Bishop Humphrey as he is concluding his term as bishop.

Assembly Business

The Assembly approved the 2023 and 2024 Investment in Ministry Plans, the 2021 and 2022 Synod Audits, and the Compensation Guidelines for 2024. Bishop Humphrey and the Officers of the Synod shared their reports and the Assembly heard from a variety of mission partners through ministry moment videos. Nathan Rummel (Trinity, Newport News), president of the Lutheran Youth Organization, presented the Youth Assembly report, centered on the Youth Assembly theme of "Followers of the Way and the Truth and the Life." He spoke to the immeasurable value of youth events, and also expressed the gathered youths' vision for the new bishop of the Virginia Synod. The next LYO Board president will be Asher Porter (Our Savior, Christiansburg).

Stars are for the Abrahamic covenant. Your descendants will outnumber the stars of the heavens. Rainbow for the promise to Noah. The Mosaic covenant is depicted by the ten commandments. The Davidic covenant promises that the Messiah would come from the lineage of David and sit on the throne of God. The rose represents Isaiah's prophecy that a rose would bloom in the desert. 

It is these truths, truths that have been ignored by most for hundreds of years, that will bring healing for both Indigenous people and non-Indigenous people.

+ National Indian Lutheran Board Discussion

Panel—There was a time, relatively recently, when Lutherans were committed to being in solidarity with Native people in the United States and leading others in issues of Indigenous rights. One of the ways the church accomplished this was to form the National Indian Lutheran Board, which operated from 1970-1987. In this panel discussion moderated by Vance Blackfox, three members of the National Indian Lutheran Board speak about their motivations for joining, the work they did together and ways we can continue that work in the future. Something to Think About

For many in the United States, the Statue of Liberty has historically and figuratively stood as a beacon of welcome. Soldiers and travelers crossing the Atlantic knew they had returned home when they could see Lady Liberty. Immigrants, longing to know welcome, dreamed of new life and opportunities symbolized by the one standing at the entrance of New York Harbor. In the poem by Emma Lazarus, "The New Colossus," the first stanza lifts up the statue as "Mother of Exiles" whose lighted torch proclaims worldwide welcome.
