A Word from Pastor Jay

I consider that the sufferings of this present time are not worth comparing with the glory about to be revealed to us.

For the creation waits with eager longing for the revealing of the children of God; or the creation was subjected to futility, not of its own will but by the will of the one who subjected it, in hope that the creation itself will be set free from its bondage to decay and will obtain the freedom of the glory of the children of God. We know that the whole creation has been groaning in labor pains until now; and not only the creation, but we ourselves, who have the first fruits of the Spirit, groan inwardly while we wait for adoption, the redemption of our bodies. For in hope we were saved. Now hope that is seen is not hope. For who hopes for what is seen? But if we hope for what we do not see, we wait for it with patience."

Romans 8: 18-25

As we enter the month of November we are bookended by celebrations in the Christian calendar where "hope" is a major theme. We begin the month with All Saints' Sunday, and as we end the month we enter into the season of Advent. Both of these church year events call on Christians to hope for that which we cannot see. All Saints, of course, is the celebration of

all who have gone before us in the faith. On this Sunday we remember those who have passed the faith on to us, from the first Christians so many centuries ago to our latest dearly departed. As we remember we do so with the greatest of hopes, that God will be true to God's promises, that the God who sent Jesus into the world, the God who faced crucifixion and triumphed in resurrection, is the God who will give the gift of everlasting life to those who have faced the great enemy... death. Still, this remains a hope, because, this side of the grave, we don't have the concrete proof that life continues in the presence of God. We find the proclamation, the promise of everlasting life in Scripture, and ultimately see our hope in God's gift of resurrection that the apostles witnessed in the crucified Jesus. Jesus, we believe, is the first fruits of what God will do, the very one who destroyed the power of death for us and for all the saints. So we hope, fervently hope, in this promise, even though we don't see the final results. Yet Paul reminds us, "For in hope we were saved. Now hope that is seen is not hope. For who hopes in what is seen? But if we hope for what we do not see, we wait for it with patience." It is this patient hope that greets us in Advent. Advent, in a very real way, is the season of hope. Advent is the dual promise of the coming of the Messiah, first in the baby born in Bethlehem, but ultimately in the Christ who is promised to come and bring us the full presence of God, through whom we will be made whole, the fullness of life will be ours.

and our hope will be realized. In the face of the darkness of this world, we light candles on the Advent wreath to announce our hope, to defy the darkness and to focus on what God has promised. Still, we do not have the fulfillment of these promises. We get bits and pieces of them... a foretaste of the feast to come... in the proclaiming of the promises God has made in Jesus and in Baptism and Communion. As we gather for Word and Sacrament in the presence of the risen Christ we are graced with promise and called to hope. In this crazy world in which we live, we hear from God through Jesus and the witness of the faithful that God has spoken the final word over our lives and over all creation. In between All Saints' Sunday and Advent, we also celebrate Christ the King Sunday, a day on which we proclaim the One in whom our hope resides. We don't just hope, "pie in the sky," for things to get better. We hope in the very one whom God sent to reveal what God has done, is doing, and ultimately will do. As we live in the meantime, even when things seem to be dark or scary or out of control, we find truth in our hope. "And not only that, but we also boast in our sufferings, knowing that suffering produces endurance, and endurance produces character, and character produces hope, and hope does not disappoint us." Romans 5: 3-5.




Jubilee Churches News

The Jubilee Churches of Gloucester, a coalition of several congregations in Gloucester (including Apostles), will be meeting in

December on December 10th at 9:30 AM at Ware Episcopal Church. The Rev. Dr. Ed Walker, pastor of Bellamy United Methodist Church, is the covener of the Jubilee Churches of Gloucester. In October, Jubilee Churches assisted 3 households with \$2,497 in rent and Dominion Power assistance. In October, Jubilee Churches were able to help a local family of seven — two parents and five children – to keep their lights on and stay in their home. The father, who serves in the National Guard, was not paid for his recent 28-day duty due to the current government shutdown. In addition to his military service, he is selfemployed, but his time away meant he was unable to earn income from his business. This unexpected gap in pay created a serious financial strain for the family. Thanks to the Jubilee Churches, we were able to step in and cover their Dominion Power bill. This assistance brought tremendous relief and stability during a stressful time - helping them avoid falling behind and keeping their home warm and bright for their children. Urge lawmakers and the Department of Agriculture to release SNAP contingency funds and to ensure no delays in hunger benefits during the government shutdown. There are 42 million Americans who depend on the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) to feed their families who are at risk of seeing delays of their November benefits due to the current government shutdown. This comes as other essential hunger programs, such as the Women, Infants and Children's Program (WIC), and free/reduced school meals are also set to run out of contingency funding due to the shutdown around the first week of November. Through ELCA World Hunger and our congregational networks across the country, we witness daily the vital role SNAP and federal programs play in preventing hunger. Our food pantries, community meals and hunger relief organizing efforts complement but cannot replace these benefits. The families we serve – working parents, children, seniors and people with disabilities – are counting on these benefits to survive. The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) 2025 Lapse of Funding Plan explicitly stated that SNAP operations should continue during a shutdown using contingency funding – before it was removed from the website in late October. Allowing hunger to deepen during a government shutdown is a policy choice and possibly a violation of law, not an inevitability. Please contact your members of Congress today, urging them to demand that USDA immediately release guidance to states, distribute contingency funding and ensure uninterrupted SNAP and hunger benefits for November and beyond. Congress should also negotiate and meet ASAP to end the government shutdown as soon as possible to avert additional harm to low-income families. Let's speak up for our neighbors in greatest need! Thank you for your advocacy.














God's Work Our Hands 2025!!

A Letter from Bishops of the ELCA to the Church "On Hope and Action"

October 8, 2025

A Letter from Bishops of the ELCA to the Church

Beloved in Christ,

Grace and peace to you in the name of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

As bishops of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA), we write to you in this moment of national and global tension with clarity and conviction. Our faith compels us to stand where Jesus stands—with and for those whom society often seeks to exclude, erase, or diminish.

Our shared confession that every person is created in the image of God (Genesis 1:27) grounds us in the conviction that all people possess inherent dignity. The incarnation of Jesus Christ reveals God's profound solidarity with humanity—especially with those who are marginalized or oppressed. The gospel we proclaim insists that our neighbor's need is the occasion for our love and that our public life is shaped by justice, mercy, and a commitment to the common good.

Further, we have a shared tradition in our social teachings which grounds us. The ELCA's Social Message on Immigration reminds us:

"We are to respond to newcomers as we would to Christ—welcoming them, meeting their immediate needs, and advocating for justice in our laws and policies."

Likewise, our recently adopted Social Statement Faith and Civic Life affirms that Christians are called to be "a public witness, holding leaders accountable when they fail to protect the vulnerable."

We are living through a time when vulnerable communities are being scapegoated and attacked. Immigrants and refugees are vilified, though Scripture commands us to welcome the stranger. People of color continue to bear the devastating weight of racism woven into the fabric of our society. Transgender people, beloved by God, are being targeted with laws and rhetoric that deny their dignity and even their right to exist. These assaults on our siblings are not political abstractions—they are deep wounds in the body of Christ.

In this time of division and fear, we, as people grounded in our faith, insist on love. This commitment flows from our faith in Christ crucified and risen—the One whose love breaks down barriers, confronts hatred, and transforms hearts.

Love insists on the dignity of every human being. Love insists on justice for the marginalized and oppressed. Love insists that the church must reflect God's diverse, life-giving community.

Love insists that we listen, speak, and act with respect, even in disagreement.

Love insists on hope, trusting that God's kingdom of justice and peace will prevail.

This love also compels us to speak clearly against Christian Nationalism, which our Churchwide Assembly named as a distortion of the Christian faith and an unhealthy form of patriotism. Christian Nationalism confuses the Gospel with political power, turns God into a mascot for the state, and privileges some people over others based on race, religion, or birthplace. This is not the way of Jesus. The kingdom of God is not a nation, not a culture, not a political ideology—it is God's reign of love, justice, and mercy for all people.

Therefore, as bishops of this church, we declare that the ELCA cannot be silent. Our call is clear:

- To proclaim the God-given dignity of every human being.
- To resist systems and ideologies, including Christian Nationalism, that oppress, dehumanize, or erase.
- To stand shoulder to shoulder with those who are targeted or harmed.

To bear public witness that the love of Christ is stronger than fear, stronger than hatred, and stronger than death.

We call on all members of the ELCA to join us in prayer, advocacy, and action:

- Pray for those who are vulnerable and for all who work for justice.
- Advocate in your communities, legislatures, and Congress for laws that protect migrants, advance racial justice, and safeguard LGBTQIA+ people.
- Engage in the holy work of hospitality, creating spaces of safety, affirmation, and belonging for all God's children.
- Model respectful dialogue in a polarized world, seeking understanding rooted in love. Hold fast to hope, trusting that the Spirit is still at work renewing creation and reconciling the world to God.

In baptism, we are marked with the cross of Christ forever. That cross is not only a sign of our hope—it is also a summons to follow Jesus into solidarity with those who suffer.

In the power of the Spirit, let us be bold. Let us be faithful. Let us Insist on Love—in our words, our actions, our public witness, and our life together.
